History of Skiing in the Czech Lands Student B
The beginnings of skiing in the Czech lands date back to 1880s when 1 founded the Czech Ski Club, the first ski-club in Europe outside of Scandinavia. J. R. Ořovský is a great figure of Czech and Czechoslovak sports beginnings. Apart from introducing skating and skiing, he' responsible for translating the first football rules into Czech and establishing the 2 In 1909 he brough several Canadian canoe and initiated the establishing of Sea (Water) Scouts in the Czech Lands. In 3 he organised the first 50-km ski race in the Krkonoše mountains, in which he also took part.
Other skis, independent of Ořovský, were brought over by Count Jan Harrach for his workers in the Krkonoše Mountains in 1892. While attending reception in Vienna, Harrach sat next to a 4 who recommended obtaining skis, which apparently, proved to be more useful in high snow than snowshoes. Based on these samples, local craftsmen began to produce similar pairs. One of them was offered to Jan Buchar, 5 in Dolní Štěpánice. He immediately recognised their potential for winter tourism. Together with their friends, he established the Bohemian Krknonoše Club 'Ski' and wrote an article about it to a Prague magazine. Later, J. R. Ořovský noticed the initiative and the following
